RANGITOTO LANDS

After the successful training by Jim Wade in the art of turning farm and wild meat into small produce in March we have had two more sessions. The Oliver family again provided large quantities of quality meat as well as the majority of the "experts" mincing, mixing and tying sausages. Below is a photo of one of several chilly bins of produce which has been provided to Trust volunteers and their families. To date they are families in Waharoa and Hamilton/Kirikiriroa. We were able to land deliver three full chilly bins of meat under the authority of "essential services" during COVID-19.



OKETE ESTUARY RESTORATION

This project is going gangbusters. Sean and Jo Wallis have set aside significant areas of wetland, springs and estuary waterfront, and have fenced the area with new fencing. After approximately 50mm of rain we commenced planting the 1700 mixed native plants in early June. Last Friday and Saturday two of our significant sponsors were hands on planting and continuing releasing of last years planting. Many thanks to Stace Hammond Lawyers and Frank Risk Management and Insurance for their wonderful help.

Pre COVID19 lockdown Catherine O'Neill and Jeremy Murray of Future Leaders Hamilton Group (www.futureleaders.nz) arrived at Okete with 16 youth who had graduated their course. These youth helped release (weed native plants so they get sun and water) last years planting. They learn't why we concentrate on wetlands, streams, springs and estuary margins, as well as which plants like certain conditions. It finished up with fish and chips by the harbour. We plan to make our relationship include this mahi (work) again and hopefully extend it to camping on the Upper Waipa River. (See the photo of the group after the mahi and before the kai).



RANGITOTO LANDS PREDATOR CONTROL

We renamed the project as it more accurately describes the location.

The 20-foot container is now situated on-site of our Tauwhare Wetlands project. James Moore of Taipa Salt is arriving early next month to turn it into a three man workshop so we can start building the 250 DOC 200 traps. Of the approximately \$88,000.00 required we have currently got \$49,493.00 made up by:

Prison Care Ministries:
